# LITERACY LIBERATES IN INDIA

**O**n a recent trip to India to visit literacy projects supported by SowHope, several women shared with SowHope board members, Ruth Posthumus and Beth Leeson, about the extremely positive difference it makes in their lives to now be able to read.

The women, who all live in the same tent city, have been attending classes to learn how to read, write, and do arithmetic for almost a year. Class is held each evening for two hours a night, five nights a week. The women bring their paperback textbooks and personal chalk boards and sit together on a mat right outside one of the

tents. The class is held in the evening because most of the women work as "day-laborers" earning about \$1.60 per day for wages.

One of the young ladies, Balamani, a 25-year-old mother of three, works whenever she can as a day-laborer washing clothes and cleaning houses. Her wages are 600 rupees per month (\$10). She is a natural leader and very motivated to learn. She goes around each evening encouraging everyone to come to





class. The women say they are very tired after working all day, but they are so happy now that they have all made the effort. Once the class is over, they expect to pass the final exam, which will give them the equivalency of completing 5th grade, by government standards.

When we visited, they were just beginning the Income Generation portion of the class. They were nervous, but excited to show us how they could read out loud. They completed some math problems given to them by Sowhope president Mary Dailey Brown. When asked, "What the best part about being able to read?" They enthusiastically told us that one of them was the first woman in the city to ever go to a bank!

**N**ow, because they are able to read signs and determine which bus to ride, they are able to go to nearby larger towns, where they can buy products to sell. Before, they could not count or use money. Balamani says with great delight, "We feel so free, now!" Literacy changes lives by liberating the learners.

## **DID YOU KNOW?**

**S**owHope has impacted over 38,000 women in its 8 years of existence. That impact represents things like having help during birth, learning how to read, or receiving a microloan.

This averages out to helping:

- 4750 women every year, 396 women every month,
- 91 women every week,
- 13 women every day,
- 1 woman every 2 hours

Average cost per woman - \$35

## **INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY - MARCH 8TH**

**S**owHope celebrates International Women's Day, IWD, which falls on March 8th every year. In different regions of the world, the general focus is often a celebration of respect, appreciation, and love towards women to celebrate women's economic, political, and social achievements. In some regions, the day is an occasion for men to express their love for women in a way somewhat similar to a mixture of Mother's Day and Valentine's Day. Many countries celebrate this day as a national holiday with parades and other public festivities, and the wearing of purple ribbons. In Italy, to celebrate the day, men give yellow mimosas to women. Yellow mimosas and chocolate are also one of the most common March 8th presents in Russia and Albania.

The idea of an International Women's Day was first introduced in 1910 at the second International Conference of Working Women in Copenhagen. The conference was attended by over 100 women from 17 countries. They proposed that every year in every country there should be a celebration on the same day, a Women's Day. The suggestion met with unanimous approval and the next year IWD was honored for the first time on March 19 when over a million women and men rallied for women's rights to work, vote, be trained, hold public office, and

to end discrimination. In 1913 IWD was transferred to March 8th and this date has remained the global date for IWD ever since.

For many years the United Nations has held annual IWD conferences with strong social awareness themes such as ending violence against women, ending poverty and hunger, uniting for peace, and empowering women educationally and economically. 1975 was designated as the 'International Women's Year'

by the UN. In the United States the whole month of **March is** now designated as '**Women's History Month**'.

This year, the UN theme is 'Inspiring Change', which ties directly to our mission statement: to inspire women around the world by promoting wellness, education, and economic opportunities. At SowHope we see the intrinsic value of investing in women to bring hope to the world and to help end poverty.
