#### **TERRORISM HITS CLOSE TO HOME IN NIGERIA**

Boko Haram, a terrorist organization in northeastern Nigeria, continues to terrorize in many areas where our Nigerian partner, Sarah, oversees more than 25 SowHope projects empowering women. Recently, Sarah's cousin and his friend were killed during a brutal attack in her parents' hometown. During the attack, people from the town ran for their lives, including 15 of them

who have sought refuge at Sarah's house some 20 miles away. This dire situation in Nigeria is only exacerbated by a COVID surge and many people are also dying of hunger.

Even after Sarah and her entire family contracted COVID and recovered, they continue to bravely encourage women's groups in 6 states of Nigeria to carry on with their farming, vocational training, animal husbandry, women's healthcare, and microloan projects. These projects are lifelines against the terrorists, especially now during this COVID surge.

#### **DEVADASI - A TRADITION OF SLAVERY**

Despite several court orders to abolish it, there are still a few states in India which continue to practice the centuries old Devadasi tradition. Devadasi is translated as the feminine form of "slave of god". Within the tradition, young girls are dedicated for life to the temple deity, Yellamma, before they reach puberty. Families believe that the goddess will be pleased with the girls and will bless the family with prosperity. The girls, known as Devadasis, never marry mortal men. Our partner in India recently submitted a project application to help 30 women caught in the Devadasi lifestyle.

Devadasis reside right on the temple grounds, cleaning and caring for the temple. They are known as "dancing girls" who subsist by providing music and dancing at religious services. They financially support themselves and the temple by begging door to door every Tuesday and Friday and through prostitution. Due to COVID restrictions, the Devadasis have become particularly vulnerable with no ability to earn any money. They and their children (resulted from the prostitution) are illiterate, poor, and perpetually trapped in this lifestyle.

This SowHope project will teach literacy and business skills training so the women can become economically independent from the temple. The project will also provide emotional and legal support to help the women overcome the stigma attached to being a Devadasi and to restore their confidence and dignity. Please consider giving generously to this important project.

#### **BREAKING NEWS - AFGHANISTAN**

Our partner in Afghanistan, who oversees a women's shelter, has notified us that there is a great need to expand services due to the recent transition in that country. They are hoping to add a mobile medical clinic, emergency food parcels, and a shelter for girls (12-13 years old) to protect them from early marriage. #### WHEN BAD DEEDS TURN TO GOOD

Margie Steiner is a long-time SowHope supporter. So, when she outsmarted a nefarious criminal, she knew exactly what to do.

Margie suffers from chronic pain which frequently keeps her up until between 4 and 6 AM. Late one night, she heard her phone buzz and saw that she had a payment of over \$100 from someone on PayPal. Curious, she emailed the person to find out why, but didn't hear back. Suddenly, she received another payment of the same amount from the same person, which happened 10 more times! Margie attempted to sign into her account, but the password had been changed.

Believing she was the victim of a hack and identity theft, she tried calling PayPal the next day and was put on hold for 3 hours before leaving a message for a call back which never came. She turned to a friend (and SowHope supporter) Bonnie Conley who figured out that over the last three weeks, 13 people from 3 different countries had tried hacking into Margie's email account.

After finally getting through to PayPal the following day, they were able to secure her account after she changed her email account, password, and security questions.

Surprisingly, she had \$1,300 of the criminal's money sitting in the account. Without any way of returning the money, PayPal told Margie to do with it as she wished. Realizing that the hackers were from Africa, Margie had the idea: I could make sure that this money goes back there and does some good by giving it to SowHope!

Thank you, Margie, for letting us share your story and for thinking that good can come out of bad situations. You truly make a difference!
