WAGONS TRIPLE WOMENS' INCOME

In a remarkable effort to uplift women from poverty, our partner in India created and conducted a transformative project that provided 20 women with customized three-wheeler pedal wagons. this equipped them with the means to earn a sustainable income and gain newfound independence.

Previously, they struggled to afford even basic necessities, these women can now travel farther, collect a much greater volume of recyclables, and sell them to large companies



for higher prices. As a result, their incomes have more than tripled since the project began, allowing them to support their families, access medical care, and provide their children with better opportunities. The joy of receiving these wagons was evident, as many women celebrated together by singing songs.

Before the wagons, these women primarily relied on collecting recyclables in big bags from around local tea shops and bus stops. However, in the comprehensive training program, the women learned to maximize their efforts by targeting highyield areas like railway stations and markets. They were also taught how to drive the wagons safely in traffic and were able to apply for official ID cards. Having a valid ID and a means of transporting their product has significantly reduced harassment from authorities. The wagons even served as temporary shelters during seasonal floods as the women and their children huddled together under the wagons to stay dry.



For many, this project has been life changing. Deepa (pictured above left), who escaped an abusive marriage, found solace and strength in her work with the new wagon. She even adopted an orphan. "This project from SowHope helped me," she said, "and because of the wagon, my character changed, and now I am even able to give help to other poor people.

GROUP OF 100 WOMEN PIONEERING BANANA GROWING IN ZIMBABWE

owHope's approach of partnering with local leaders to address Olocal problems using local solutions is making a tangible difference in the lives of women, perfectly illustrated in the story of our partner Tendai in Zimbabwe. As the severe effects of climate change impact Zimbabwe, farmers are seeking more climateresilient methods of farming. During the 2023-2024 planting season, Tendai's groundbreaking idea of growing bananas in a semi-desert area was inspired by discussions with friends in Kenya and Zambia, and a visit to Honde Valley — the only region in Zimbabwe where bananas are currently grown.

Dr. Sylvia Juta, SowHope's Program Director, recently visited Tendai's new banana farm and was impressed by the incredible work being done by a group of 100 women. These women are



excited to be pioneers in the banana project and are filled with hope for the future. They shared their vision of creating various value-added products from their banana plantation, including banana flour for baking, instant baby porridge, and banana wine. The banana stalks will also be used to make woven goods, while the banana leaves will provide feed for poultry and pigs. The women are also raising pigs and guinea fowls, and growing pawpaw trees.

When Dr. Juta asked Tendai why the women were so enthusiastic about the project, she explained that women are particularly impacted by climate change because they are often responsible for feeding their families. This banana project offers them a sustainable source of both food and income. They also take great pride in being the first in their area to launch such a project and are now teaching men in the community how to grow bananas.


